It's wins or go time for Tuggeranong Vikings and Uni-Norths Owls as the Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup rolls on to the preliminary final stage. Both sides were involved in semi-final barn burners last weekend, Viking obviously on the wrong end of their result against Royals and Owls brimming with confidence after advancing past the Gungahlin Eagles.

History, names on paper, and just the obvious makes you think this may be a step too far for the Owls, but on a closer viewing, logic tells you this may well be closer than you think. Let's go way back to 2018. The Owls shocked the Vikings on their home soil and should have completed the double on the eventual champions and but for a final minute try from Sione Taula, they would have, though that did finish all square.

This year, Owls haven't been able to beat Vikings, or drawn for that matter. However, both matchups were tight affairs, particularly round four. The final score, 22-27 was a fair reflection of the game, but the Owls very well could have claimed victory on that day, their relentless style and unwillingness to give up proving a worthy match for the Vikings talent.

In Round 11, they met once again this time at Viking Park. In that game, the home side shot out to a 29-0 lead in the first half, showing their devastating brilliance when they hit their

straps. But, the Owls once again refused to go down without a fight, pulling back 20 of their own to leave both a gloss on the score, 29-20 but also a feeling that they could hang with Vikings, even at their best.

Hang on is probably what they're going to have to do as well. The odds are against them, no question. Last week, Vikings were about 30% off their best and still had a chance to beat Royals.

We forget how young Vikings are in places. Yes, they are defending champions, but the group is so different. Vunipola Fifita, Lachlan Lonergan, Angus Wagner, Darcy Swain Cooper Taekata, Jayme Field, Luke Gersekowski, Noah Lolesio, Len Ikitau, these are all guys still learning their craft. They're amazing talents, but sometimes experience counts for more and after going through that game against Royals, they'll be more prepared this time around.

In all honesty, it's hard to see Uni-Norths doing it again. They had to do so much work just to be here, another peak may be too much mountain to climb. If they can defend well, frustrate Vikings and leave them nervous in the closing stages, they have a shot but if Tuggies get on a roll early, it could get ugly.



Finals football can do strange things to teams. Dominant for the entirety of the 2019 Premier Division Second Grade competition, the Gungahlin Eagles finally came unstuck just eighty minutes away from a place in the Grand Final last weekend, as they were given a lesson in knockout football by a revitalised Tuggeranong Vikings.

The Vikings outscored the table-toppers by six tries to four to consign the Eagles to the Preliminary Final, Gungahlin's Connor Jones and Mathew Clifton both claiming a brace of tries each. Claude Edwards converted three, but the Vikings were in superb form and were more than worthy of securing their place in the big showdown, where they will await the winners of this huge match-up.

Queanbeyan Whites kept their season alive as they dumped Canberra Royals out of the competition in an upset at Viking Park on the Sunday as tries from Lewis Bozzato and Fraser Smith, plus two conversions from Ben O'Halloran, secured the Whites passage into the next phase. Considering they ended the season fourth, they'll be big underdogs against the Eagles this weekend.

Gungahlin, as you'd expect from a team that cruised through the regular season, had the wood on the Whites in their meetings in 2019, starting with a comfortable 40-17 victory at Nicholls back in Round 4. Mitchell Ward scored

two tries on that occasion with Edwards scoring one of his own and kicking five from the tee. Angus Balmaks and Matt Taylor responded for the defeated Queanbeyan side.

It was a similar tale in Round 11 at Campese Field as Eagles, once more, scored forty points, this time restricting Whites to a mere seven in response, Jason Wirangi crossing for the home team. Edwards again grabbed a five-pointer and kicked four conversions, in a match in which the Eagles scored five tries from five different tryscorers. Mitchell Connolly, Adam Rummery, Clifton and Liam Colley joining Edwards on the scoreboard.

All signs would point to an Eagles win but, as we saw just seven days ago, the vagaries of finals football are that it is just that unpredictable. A bounce here, a mistake there or, maybe just a piece of rugby magic, can propel a team to new heights. Whites will be looking to make sure that its them who achieve this in what promises to be a feisty fixture.

The First Division First Grade and Second Grade competitions move into the Preliminary Final stage with teams just eighty minutes, or so, away from either a Grand Final spot, or the memories of another season that promised much but, in the final calculations, failed to deliver, the margins are that fine and we can be sure to see some quality rugby played as a result.

Gungahlin Eagles, as expected following their domination of the division in 2019, have made their way to next week's Grand Final and await the winners of this weekend's Preliminary Final match-up as ADFA play the Goulburn Dirty Reds. The Academy, who ended the season fourth, made the Eagles work all the way for their progression, a 24-21 win for the Eagles showing that the ADFA side will be a tough nut for the Dirty Reds to crack.

Their only previous meeting this season came back in Round 10 at Simon Poidevin Rugby Park in Goulburn as the Dirty Reds were beaten 24-15 by a fired-up ADFA outfit. In a top match, the visiting side outscored the home team by four tries to two with Jonte Heirdsfield, Zane Viljoen, Sam Hicks and Joshua Tatana doing the honours for the Academy.

ADFA entered the finals series by beating Canberra Royals 31-19 before the narrow loss to the Eagles, whilst the Dirty Reds were also downed by the Eagles in Week 1, losing 24-19 before their 30-12 success over the Queanbeyan Whites on Sunday. Mikael Webber was his useful dead-eyed self from the tee, three conversions and three penalties extending the Goulburn points tally after three

tries were claimed by Bradley Clements, Matthew Spratley and Simon Graves.

In First Division Second Grade Canberra Royals, who ended the year on top of the pile, have been unceremoniously dumped from the competition after being stunned by sixth-placed Western Districts who, under the new finals format, are now just eighty minutes away from a shot at the Grand Final. Tries from Amos King, Naqase Khan, Tavake Taholo, Des Faigafa and Patrick Bacon keeps Wests unlikely dream burning.

Tuggeranong Vikings provide the opposition for the knockout clash, their narrow 15-12 loss to Queanbeyan seeing the Whites progress to the big dance. Ryan Slater and Siasoi Fakalolo crossed for the Vikings who, despite Wests later surge, would be considered favourites to get a re-match shot at Queanbeyan next weekend.

The Colts competition produced a couple of massive results in the semi-finals with Royals advancing to the Grand-Final against Gungahlin, and Queanbeyan bowling Tuggeranong out of the competition on Sunday.

Gungahlin were favourites going into their qualifying final against the Blue-Baggers, but Royals were never seen as just making up the numbers.

Still, smart pre-match betting would have gone the way of the Eagles, and despite the result, Gungahlin still looked every bit the side that claimed the minor premiership. They actually outscored Royals in tries, 4 to 3 but Thomas Hallam's penalty goals made the difference on the day for the second placed side. 23-22 reflected just how evenly matched these two sides were, but Royals advance.

They'll have the week off this week while Gungahlin will look to rebound against Queanbeyan, who are expected to have a very strong side for the preliminary final. Their clash with Vikings last week was similar in some ways to the Qualifying final.

Vikings had their chances to win the game, but it was Queanbeyan who held their nerve later in the piece, Haloti Fonua stepping up from 45 metres out, seven minutes after the hooter, to kick Queanbeyan to victory.

That match winner set's up a fascinating contest today between the Whites and Gungahlin. The two sides last met in Round 11 where the Eagles bashed Queanbeyan on their home turf, 38-7.

Sam Hyland was the star that day, scoring a breathtaking hattrick though the Eagles did have playmaking maestro Joey Caputo in their ranks that day, and he'll be unavailable through injury for this one.

Queanbeyan on the other hand have seen a number of big performers come back into their stocks for finals. The likes of Zeph Tuinona, Dave Teoteo and Jack Gilmour have been called upon to play first grade at times this season, so having those players come back into the fold for Queanbeyan is a massive boost for their prospects moving forward.

On balance, you still get the sense that this wounded Eagles side has the ability to win in this game. Queanbeyan are buzzing, in a state of eurphoria off the back of that incredible win last week. Gungahlin on the other hand will have been stewing in their disappointment all week, ready to get some retribution this week.

The question is; does Queanbeyan'c confidence help spur them on, or have they played their best game already? For Gungahlin, can they use defeat to fuel a comeback, or has their run to a premiership run out of steam?

If Royals and the Owls gutsy semi-final victories taught us anything, it's that once you reach the playoffs, any preconceptions have to be gone. Very few, if any would have picked both Royals advancing to the Grand-Final and the owls beating Gungahlin. Maybe you tip one upset, but not both.

It's hard to think which game was more of a shock. Royals were incredible all year, but on paper the odds just seemed stacked against them. Then, losing inspirational skipper Ben Johnston at the break, it seemed impossible for Royals to escape with victory.

From the opening kick-off Vikings looked dangerous with ball in hand. U20 star Noah Lolesio in particular looked in rare form early, setting up the Vikings opening try, Len Ikitau providing the finish. But, as they did all day, Royals responded to the challenge and with their first real attack of the game, they levelled it up through Seth Going, a brilliant try but outdone by a fabulous touchline conversion from Pedro Rolando.

Vikings added two penalties either side of halftime and looked comfortable six points clear. Royals had other ideas. Living off scraps, they made best use of every bit of ball they got in the attacking zone. Veteran Craig McMahon got the first of their second half tries, and in the 78th minute, Johnston's replacement Lincoln Smith got the sealer, showing pace and power to dive over in front of the rapt Royals supporters. The day belonged to Rolando in the end. The halfback magician kicked three goals from three, all on the touchline giving Royals a famous 21-13 win.

Day two brought even more drama, as bitter rivals Gungahlin and Uni-Norths met once again at Viking Park. The first half was marred by a couple injuries on both sides, Owls losing key playmakers Willoughby Axelsen and Jordan Thomson. Eagles also saw Tayn Atkins leave the park, talismanic fullback Mack Hansen would also depart in the opening stanza.

With both sides running repairs, it was the Owls who responded best. With Hamish Dawson and Byron Hollingworth-Dessent on the park, Uni-Norths switched up their tempo, playing more expansive rugby rather than relying on a kicking game. Will Sankey's try was brilliant, followed up by a cracking finish from Man of the Match Ben Love down the righthand edge.

Eagles responded, scoring a try just after the break, through club legend Rocky Ilolahia. The bruising number 8 scored another in typical rampaging form later, but good play from the Eagles was consistently undermined by poor discipline. Owls punished Gungahlin from the tee in the second half, kicking four penalty goals. Josh Gillard gave the Eagles hope late on, but as they did for the entire 80 minutes, Owls hunted at the breakdown, won the ball, worked the phases before forcing a penalty which they turned into three points. It's a winning formula which Vikings will need to be aware of this week.






