OVERVIEW

Australian rugby union supports and encourages the involvement of diverse groups of people in rugby as evidenced by their inclusion policy. In this learning experience students explore the meaning of diversity in terms of rugby, family and school and discuss the importance of valuing differences within groups. Students learn how rugby is a game for all, regardless of age, gender, sexual preference, ability, culture, or shape and size.

POSSIBLE LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES / TASKS

- See what you already know about the Pacific region including the Pacific Ocean, bordering countries, continents, seas, climate, natural resources, natural hazards, history etc.
- Look at the Rugby playing countries throughout the region and discuss why Rugby might be such a popular sport in the region.
- View one or more of the Rugby stories from PNG, Samoa, Cook Islands and Tahiti and point out similarities and differences between their way of life and our way of life in Australia.
- Think about how schools in the Pacific might be similar or different to ours.
- Talk about why it is important to recognise and respect other people's culture or way of life.
- Talk about one of the most visual expressions of Pacific Island culture at international Rugby events, i.e. war dances. View one or more of the war dances including the NZ Haka, Samoan Siva Tau, Tongan Sipi Tau, Fiji iBOLE, and Cook Islands war dance.
- Discuss what the war dance/s look, sound and feel like in your opinion and share ideas with the class.
- Find out more about the NZ Haka and how it is part of New Zealanders' national identity.
- Explore some other interesting cultural aspects of the Pacific region including ceremonies, body art, music and famous artists.

REFLECTION

Students reflect on the diversity of Pacific Island culture and the importance war dances have in shaping people's national identity. Students reflect on the importance of recognising and respecting others' cultures in everyday life and at large sporting events.

EXTENSION IDEAS

- Research other things Rugby teams may do to symbolise pride, strength, unity or other important values before a match.
- Research other rituals people or groups perform in life.
- Develop your own personal ritual to use before big sporting events. Explain your choice and reason to the class.
- Research controversies surrounding the Haka and discuss these as part of a make-believe current affairs radio program.
