The Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup is ready for a grandstand finish, starting with what could be a top-four decider between Uni-Norths and Queanbeyan.

Owls are perched in fourth place heading into round 15, seven clear of the Whites in fifth. Queanbeyan probably have the more favourable run in, so if they can get a result today, that last playoff spot will be right up for grabs.

Both teams had a chance to close the gap on the top-three but came up just short. The Owls in particular will be probably feel they gave one away against the Eagles at Nicholls enclosed. Look, it was a back and forth affair, and Gungahlin are at such a high level right now that even when they're not firing on all cylinders, they still expect to win but the Owls were so good last weekend, particularly in defence.

The difference on the day was the Eagles extra bit of quality in attack. Tamati loane to name one, was just outstanding. His match winner capped off an incredible performance which featured a number of bone-rattling tackles and barn storming carries, the final score 26-20.

Queanbeyan probably weren't as close as the Owls to upsetting the leaders, but still had their chances against Royals. 23-14 doesn't exactly reflect the game, but all in all, Royals controlled proceedings. They certainly weren't dominant though, and the Whites will take some confidence from the hard-fought contest.

At Griffith Oval, Tuggeranong Vikings laid waste to Easts 66-7. The defending champions were bolstered by the return of a number of frontline players which made the task for Easts that much greater.

Angus Wagner and Darcy Swain were back in red and white after touring Argentina with the Brumbies, while Noah Lolesio and Lachlan Lonergan also returned from the land of fire and ice after finishing second in the Junior World Cup. On the day however, the headlines belonged to Ernest Suavai who finished the rout with a spectacular hattrick of tries.

Gungahlin complete their run of home fixtures against Wests today, which is their charity round. Eagles along with Royals and Vikings have already sealed a top-three finish, but with just three points separating them, every match point could be crucial, as they fight for the chance to earn a second bite at making the grand final if they'll need it.



In recent editions of Stampede there has appeared informative biographies with respect to several of our "home grown" Wallabies, taken from the pages of Jack Pollard's excellent history of the game, "Australian Rugby Union: The Game and the Players.'

These pre-professional stars, who were selected to play for Australia in Test Match rugby prior to 1984 had to combine their rugby abilities with plenty of other, more personal, sacrifices to make it at the elite level.

It is important to note just what commitment, motivation and sacrifice that these players were confronted with along the Wallaby Way – the way of that rugby era consisted of a number of selectorial paths to the Wallaby Gold, a long and drawn out process that began close to home.

There was usually a large local ACTRU representative program including an annual international representative match and these players would also be asked to play in the annual Country Week tournament against other NSW Country Rugby Zones

From here, selection in a NSW Country firsts or second XV to play in the annual representative match against a Sydney firsts or second XV was the next step, certain ACTRU players would then be selected to play for NSW Country XV for their Representative program, sometimes involving an overseas tour to NZ and a match against touring International countries.

After completing these matches ACTRU players could then be selected for the NSW Representative team who played against visiting International teams and Queensland each season.

The next commitment, if selected, was to

play Wallaby trials and then on to Wallaby selection playing visiting International countries in up to three local test matches. Sometimes the Australian Wallabies did tour overseas, and tourists could be expected to be away for three months, particularly if the tour was to the British Isles and France

It must be remembered that selected Wallabies from the ACT Union were not remunerated in any way, such was the ruling of the International Rugby Board of those days. Unpaid leave, the use of diminishing recreation leave and, hopefully, being employed by sympathetic employers, as well as club fundraising did assist our players attaining Wallaby selection and especially status for the ACTRU

When our Union was able to attain separate status and therefore be recognised by the Australian Rugby Union in November 1974, the Wallaby pathway for our players became somewhat easier and more manageable with respect to the time required for travel on the Wallaby way – players were not committed to NSW Country nor NSW selection – therefore selection in the ACTRU Representative team commenced the pathway to become a Wallaby.

With the advent of the Brumbies in 1996 a selection pathway became even easier involving selection in the Brumbies commencing the journey to the international stage.

Whilst our international representatives of today prepare for the Rugby Championship, and the ultimate goal of representing Australia at the 2019 Rugby World Cup in Japan, its worth recalling how different it was as recently as the seventies. A prime example, being Owen Butler of the ACT Northern Suburbs team.

Butler, known as Spider, was once was required to spend 19 weekends out of 21 away in one year from home when playing Representative matches in his Wallaby pathway in late the 1960' and early 1970's. His pathway from Northern Suburbs took in the ACTRU, NSW Country and then the international team.

There are many more of our ACTRU Representative players of that time who did that as well, in 1970 in all thirteen players from the ACTRU Country Week Squad were selected and played for either NSW Country firsts or NSW Country seconds. It was the next step on a long and arduous route to the top.


