FLASHBACK: 60 YEARS AGO — 1959 GRAND FINAL

Queanbeyan convincingly defeated Canberra Royals by 21-14 to win the 1959 A.C.T.R.U. first grade premiership. Behind 11-6 at half time, Queanbeyan scored two tries in the opening minutes of the second half. This was the inspiration the team needed, and for the remainder of the match the Whites always looked the better side. Queanbeyan, following their kick off, penned Royals on their 25 line. A penalty against Hansen for offside, two minutes from the start, gave Armour an easy chance and Queanbeyan the lead. A penalty by Armour went wide and then from a lineout the ball flew across Royals' backline to go to ground in the corner. Ingram gathered the bounce to dive over and Queanbevan led 6-0 after 28 minutes. From a ruck on Queanbeyan's 25 Hawke came on the blind side. O'Keefe's pass to Meere hit the ground but the winger fielded the ball and flashed over in the corner and Royals were in the game with the score 6-3.

Then suddenly Royals came to life with what was destined to be the only "purple patch" of the game. Well inside their own half Maguire, Hawke and Hansen made ground with Hansen handling the ball twice before in-passing to Douch who flashed into the movement from the full back

position to cap a typical Royals movement with a try between the posts. Keeley converted and Royals led 8-6 after 35 minutes. Royals continued to look dangerous for the remainder of this period and three extra points came their way with a penalty against Morton for a late tackle of Hawke gave Keeley an easy chance and at the break Royals led 11-6. Action came immediately in the second half. Queanbeyan stormed Royals line and a minute after play began R. Rogers was over in the corner. Queanbeyan came again in similar fashion from the kick off and Rogers duplicated his try to put Queanbeyan in front 12-11. Rudd then swooped on a dropped pass to go over and put the Whites further ahead. The end for the Blues came when S. Rogers received the ball to come infield through a breaking ruck to pass to Weekes for the winger to go over and at 18-11 the game was safe for Queanbevan.

FLASHBACK: 50 YEARS AGO — 1969 GRAND FINAL

Western District completed a tremendous season when it overwhelmed Ainslie in the first 15 minutes of the rugby union grand final at Manuka Oval on Saturday to take a grip on the premiership which from then on it never relinguished. Wests won the match 27-6. In the most devastating opening to a grand final I have ever witnessed, they scored three tries in the first 15 minutes to go to an 11-0 lead and virtu ally wrap up the premiership. From the opening whistle play was locked in the Ainslie 25yd area and it was no surprise when, from a lineout close to the Ainslie line, winger Bob Barlow dived over to score West's first try in the eighth minute. Wests kept up the pressure and tries by centre Garry Thomas in the 13th and 15th minutes and a conversion by fullback Jim Smith put the side in an almost unbeatable position. Wests made it 14-0 when Ainslie breakaway Chris Norman was caught off side in a lineout and Smith kicked a good penalty.

Ainslie looked like ending (he first half scoreless when fullback Mick Craft, gathering the ball on his own 25, saw a gap in the defence and streaked through with centre Jim Badger in support. Craft got the ball away inside to Badger and, as Smith moved in to tackle him, Badger passed to second-

rower Barry Gallagher who ranged up inside him. Showing a good turn of speed for a forward Gallagher raced away from the defence to score a great try. In the second half, however, Wests took control again. Ainslie had no answer to the pace of the Wests backs. Thomas added a try, Smith kicked two goals and a penalty goal and Lubans capped a great game by scoring one of Wests' rare forward tries. Stuart Pasfield landed a penalty for Ainslie, but Wests were untroubled to win.



FLASHBACK: 40 YEARS AGO — 1979 GRAND FINAL

Royals' 13-12 win against Queanbeyan in the ACT rugby union grand final yesterday was the more impressive because the team of relatively young and inexperienced players came from behind to shrug off immense pressure. They grabbed two of the very few chances presented them in a very tight but surprisingly open and totally absorbing game and grabbed them when Queanbeyan's first senior premiership in 20 years seemed only a formality and only seconds away. They also came back when they had shown every sign of panic and dejection, so, fittingly capped a great season and, with the dejected Queanbeyan men, sculpted one of those games which will be talked about for years to come. Queanbeyan, which had so dominated the match and seemed so to deserve to win, relaxed their hitherto unrelenting pressure almost imperceptibly.

With injury time running out they gave Michael O'Connor the inch and he took the field goal that marked the mile-long difference between being the premiers and being, under the Australian system, nothing. it was a climactic ending to a game which had shown an exceptionally large and excited crowd just about every aspect of the code. Queanbeyan took the lead at three, minutes when John Maguire kicked a penalty.



Then David Wilson equalised at 10 minutes. He missed at 20 and Maguire put Queanbeyan ahead at 32. It stayed Queanbeyan 6, Royals 3, at halftime. Maguire missed at four minutes of the second half, Wilson at nine. Berry scored at 31 minutes with this converted to a penalty try, which Maguire converted to give Queanbeyan a 12-3 lead. FLASHBACK: 30 YEARS AGO — 1989 GRAND FINAL

Michael Roche rode from the pitch like a centurion on the shoulders of his team after leading Royals to victory in the ACT Rugby Union premiership at Manuka yesterday. It was a triumphant progression into history for Roche, who was playing his 227th, and last, game for Royals. He had led them, against all odds, to a 12-7 victory over Daramalan. The victory was the sweeter because it was won in one of the best grand finals in many a year. Andrew Clark set up Royals' first try. Adam Friend had kicked Daramalan into its 3-0 lead after 33 minutes of a first half which had fled in total absorption. Within three minutes of kick-off, Clark charged down a clearing kick. He had time to search for the ball, which had settled behind him, while Daramalan dithered, find it, gain ground and pass wide. Anthony Hofmeier was untended and sped over and round. Anthony Moore, at five-eighth, playing as positively as everyone else, kicked his first of two attempts for two successes.

Clark featured again in the next try at 15 minutes. Serviced well by a pack which knew only forward gear, halfback David Kinnane spun maul ball. Clark dashed through and would have scored if he had not slipped on his third side-step. He went down, the forwards poured in to gain the scrum

feed. They then won ball quickly and neatly, yet again. John Ross picked up, hinted at a feint right but went straight over for a soft try and an easy Moore conversion. It was 12-3. Daramalan rallied but could not beat Roche, Ross or Kani Ferris to the ball, nor overcome the tight five of Stewart Thomas, Dean Merrilees, Geoff Didier, Jim Taylor and a fanatically dedicated Matt Rainey, playing his best game of my experience. Fulivai's try came at 34 minutes after a sharp Daramalan rally. He turned an orthodox back move into a beautifully choreographed solo, pivoting round and through tackles to the line.. It was a matter of playing time out until Roche could be deservedly hoisted into ACT Rugby Union's history.

Canberra Royals sharp-shooter Pedro Rolando has claimed the 2019 MacDougall medal, presented to him this week during the annual Awards Ceremony held at the Rex Hotel in Canberra.

The scrum-half also scooped yet another Gus Vallance Memorial Trophy at the 2019 MacDougall Medal Awards, the silverware presented to the highest points scorer in the first-grade competition, the unerring boot of the Canberra Royals scrumhalf being a major factor in the Royals charge towards finals football.

Born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, the South American has been a mainstay for the Royals for a number of years now and was initially capped at NRC level in 2017 and will likely compete at that level again this season. An experienced head, Rolando is often tasked with guiding the younger players around the park when called upon.

Rolando's haul of 212 points, included nine tries as well as a plethora of points from his metronomic boot, putting him well clear of his closest challenge for the Medal, Tuggeranong Vikings scrumhalf Ryan Lonergan.

'GPS have clinched the Australian club rugby championship with a magnificent fightback against the fancied Sydney Uni, clawing back from a 17-point deficit in the second half.' So read the opening paragraph of a report on rugby.com. au last March as the Queenslanders saw off the challenge of NSW Champions Sydney University to be crowned 'Australian Club Champions'.

It's unarguable that GPS are a quality side and deserve the mantle, but wouldn't it be great if one of our own, our club rugby Champions from the Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup, were given a chance to compete and claim the title? Canberra Royals and Tuggeranong Vikings, winners of the local competition in the past two seasons, would surely have given GPS or Sydney University a run for their money.

But why stop there? The Dewar Shield Champions from Victoria could be invited to the party. For example, Melbourne RFC who are favourites for the Shield would be a worthy opponent for any of the aforementioned club-sides and, there's the potential for further expansion with the winners

of the other State and territories in Australia being given a shot.

The FFA, the guardians of the round-ball code in Australia, currently have a similar competition in progress where the league champions, those who finish top of the respective round-robin from NSW, ACT, Queensland, Northern NSW, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria and Western Australia meet in a free-draw knockout finals series.

The Quarter Finals is drawn randomly whilst the hosts for the semi-finals are determined via a formula relating to time of winning (normal time, extra time or penalties), goals scored and allowed, and yellow/red cards. This competition, in its infancy, has yet to catch the imagination as much as the FFA Cup, but allows local players to shine on the national stage.

Costs, of course, would need to be taken into consideration, but there must be a sponsor out there who would like the opportunity to promote their brand nationally, opening the doors of their business to prospective new customers by

sponsoring the naming rights of something that is unique and would tap into the spirit of grassroots rugby, club-land, where the badge on your jersey is the be-all and end-all.

Format would be key, perhaps there would be a dispensation into the latter stages for the 'big boys' from New South Wales and Queensland, straight to the semi-finals, the other teams playing a series of matches depending on respective strengths of the unions to fill the remaining two spots. That way any major missmatches could be avoided.

All of this, and potentially broadcast nationally via Fox Sports and their subsidiaries, even rugby. com.au might be keen to show fixtures, and getting free-to-air coverage would be crucial, could bring yet more attention to the burgeoning club game, bring interest in the sport and, just maybe, give a reinvigoration to the rugby fan and encourage them to visit their local Super Rugby club.

At the moment it's all pie in the sky. The costs for the Club Championships as it was run in 2018 were funded by the two competing teams. That shouldn't have to happen. To promote the sport and expand its horizons beyond the often-myopic interest of each state, something that is different, accessible and with the potential to offer intrigue, and the exotic and unknown, is surely worth exploring further. With the NRC in need of re-vamp, is club rugby, and a national's finals series the way ahead?

The Canberra Vikings National Rugby Championship challenge for 2019 will begin with a visit to Melbourne to take on the Rising and will include four home matches, all at Viking Park, as the latest instalment of the exciting competition gets underway in late August. A popular feature of the NRC will be continuing the use of suburban grounds, bringing fans closer to the action with all the benefits of Club Rugby. One match per round will be broadcast LIVE on FOX SPORTS with the remaining games to be shown LIVE on Kayo Sports and RUGBY.com.au.

The 2019 season will open with a NSW derby between Sydney and the NSW Country Eagles at Apex Oval in Dubbo. Last year's runners up, Queensland Country start their campaign in Perth against the Western Force, whilst the Vikings take on Melbourne Rising. Two of the Vikings home matches will precede Wallabies fixtures at the Rugby World Cup with the matches against Fiji Drua, on Saturday 28 September, and Sydney, on Saturday 5 October being played with mid-day kick-offs as Australia meet Fiji and Uruguay in Pool encounters in Japan at 2.45pm om the same day.

Rugby Australia will also trial two law variations for World Rugby in this year's NRC with law 21 amended and an introduction of a 50:22 kicking play. Law 21 will change to see the defending team be rewarded for good defence with a goal line drop out when the ball is held up in the in-goal area. A 50:22 will reward a team that kicks the ball indirectly from open play or a free-kick from within their own half and the ball reaches the touchline inside their opponents' 22 or the ball reaches the touchline inside their opponent's half. The attacking team will then have the lineout throw, rewarding aggressive territorial kicking.

FLASHBACK: ROYALS MAKE GRAND FINAL BREAKTHROUGH

ROYALS STOP NORTH ATTACK IN UNION

ATJACKING Itachem Subwiss centre, Tony E vens, is determinedly stelled by Ret Mequire and G. Raddiffic, of Camberra Reysh, in the R apply Union grand final en Saturdeys. Royals forward, Bill Keeley, and winger W. Bodle, are ready to make certain Evens goes to the council. Solid stacking by bosh teams was a his highly to the match, won by Royals, 11-2.

The 1954 ACT Rugby Union Grand Final was a memorable occasion for those of a Royal Blue persuasion as, at the fourth time of asking, the Canberra Royals finally secured the John I Dent Cup. The men from Phillip had been beaten finalists in each of the three preceding years, losing all three to the storing-RMC side of that era, 19-9 in 1951, 9-5 in 1952 and 18-5 in 1953.

Their opponents in the 1954 Final were surprise package Norths, last finalists themselves sin 1948 when they won against RMC. Norths had finished the regular season in fourth on the ladder and won their way into the Grand Final by disposing of Easts 14-3 in the Minor Semi-Final (now Elimination Final) before defeating RMC 11-9 in the Preliminary Final.

According to contemporary reports of the time, Royals Captain Brice Weisell was a star of the Grand Final day whilst ACTRU Treasurer, Arty Duffel was Norths Coach in the game. Brian Cook, who played on the wing for Norths in the 1954 Grand Final, would go onto take up the whistle and would be in charge of the 1956 version between RMC and Norths.

As for the game itself, Royals edged a close encounter 11-3 to take home their first title, a try from three-quarter W.U. Bodle was converted by Weisell who also added a brace of penalties. Norths captain J. Goodwin crossed for the vanquished team's sole points of the encounter which attracted a decent sized crowd to the venue, Manuka Oval.

It's here, the big one and despite 2019 being one of the most competitive years in recent history, Vikings and Royals will matchup once again to crown a Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup champion.

It's where most would have thought we would end up on the final day of the season, but that doesn't make this battle any less compelling. With Vikings struggling to hit top gear the last two weeks, the playing field going into this one couldn't be more even. You'd guess that anyway. Yes, Vikings beat Royals twice in the regular season, but the Blue Baggers came out on top two weeks ago in the Semi-Final and have the added benefit of the extra week off.

Vikings on the other hand endured another brutal 80 minutes last Saturday against the Uni-Norths Owls, who pushed the champions to the final whistle. Early on, Tuggeranong looked to be peaking at the right time. Scoring twice early, and threatening another, Vikings played with a lethal combination of pace and accuracy.

However, and perhaps the bulk of the credit here should go to the Owls, Vikings lost their way a bit, in a similar way that happened against Royals the previous week. It's in those middle minutes, that Vikings have traditionally turned the screw and gone on to dominate, but the second-wind just didn't show up and they were forced to cling on against a surging Owls squad.

But they did hang on. They weren't always at their best in the regular season, but they still finished top of the heap. Vikings have a winning culture, an All-Black-esque ability to grind out wins, and produce form when it's needed. So yes, it's an evenly matched Grand Final but you just get the sense that Vikings have another two levels to go to. Royals will have to match them when they start to roll, slow the quick ball as they did last time out and as Uni-Norths did.

In attack, they'll have to take opportunities. Almost every time they entered Vikings redzone, Royals came away with points in the semi, and it was still close. It may take another vintage Pedro Rolando performance from the boot, but if that's what it takes, Royals will happily kick their way to victory.

It's a fascinating contest, one which all of ACT rugby will relish. It's Canberra's answer to El Clasico, a clash of titans whose intertwining history makes this more than a standard Grand-Final. A fitting way, to end another remarkable season, in the Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup.

Today's encounter between Royals and Vikings will be the ninth time that these old foes have met in the title decider as the two go into battle for the Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup. The most recent of those was, of course, just twelve months ago when the Vikings emerged as victors, downing the Royals 29-17, in what was a cracking showpiece to end the season.

It was unsurprising that the Grand Final produced a close tie, a match befitting the big occasion as, in the main, that's been the story of Vikings versus Royals when they have met with the silverware up for grabs. History favours the Vikings, their six victories to Royals brace tipping the balance of success in their favour, and yet few would be certain of the outcome when these two goliaths meet on the playing fields of the nation's capital.

Royals won the first of the big battles for the John I Dent Cup, the 1991 victory being the first final that Tuggeranong contested, and Royals eight Grand Final of an unprecedented eleven in a row. The last of that run was also against the Vikings who claimed their inaugural crown in 1994 with a five-point win over the men from Phillip Enclosed.

That was the start of a hex that the Vikings had on Royals in Grand Finals with the Southsiders winning the next four times that they clashed,

the treble winning 1997-1999 vintage followed by a seven-point win in the 2013 meeting. Royals finally got their hands back on the trophy in 2015, 24 years after their previous victory, whilst just last term the Vikings edged their great rivals. This afternoon will write another chapter in the rich history of the Vikings-Royals rivalry and, just like their previous eight encounters, this one could go either way.

The scoreboard reads two to one in favour of Vikings in the season matchups so far, but it's Royals who hold bragging rights heading into today's Grand-Final. It was June before we were treated to the first 2018 Grand Final rematch and at the time, it was Royals who had the momentum. Unbeaten and coming off a hard-fought victory against Gungahlin, the Blue Baggers certainly weren't expecting the beatdown that was coming their way.

Vikings on the other hand, were only starting to hit their straps after a sluggish start, making the performance they put in that much more devastating. Royals started the game well, but once Vikings got on a roll, they were unplayable on the day. The win was inspired by a young Vikings pack that pregame was tipped to struggle against the more experience Royals unit. With a number of frontline players unavailable, some of the Vikings young stock were forced to step up, not least Jack Wright who made his First Grade debut in the game.

He was brilliant, as were the rest of the Vikings forwards, the backs backing up with a couple fabulous finishes, Len Ikitau at the heart of everything, his pass to Dean Wilson in the closing moments capping off a dominant 54-17 win. Once again, we waited for the rematch. Finally, it came on the final day of

the season with Vikings once again coming away victorious. That game was different though. Vikings shot out to an early lead, but Royals stayed in touch and even could have won the game late on. Ultimately, the gap was too big to bridge for Royals and Vikings hung on for a Minor Premiership sealing victory, 22-17.

Ironically, Vikings winning meant they set a date against Royals the following week in the qualification final. Vikings once again looked the more dangerous side early on and had the lion share of possession in the opening stanza, but only managed to open a slim lead. Royals still seemed like they would succumb to another loss. Somehow, Royals managed to pull themselves out of the hole and found enough inspiration to drag themselves into the lead and with pure grit and determination, they hung on for a famous, 21-13 win thanks to tries from Seth Going, Craig McMahon and Lincoln Smith, all of which were converted by Pedro Rolando.

Recent history often counts for very little in these games. Last year, Royals had the rub over Vikings and Tuggeranong won reasonably comfortably in the Grand-Final. So study the form guide all you like, and make your predictions, but when the Cup is visible on the sideline, anything can happen.

SEASON REVIEW

Before the season, a lot of people said Royals relied too heavily on a couple of star players, and that without them, they may struggle. You can see their argument. Two years ago, when Royals went unbeaten to win the John I Dent Cup, they were spurred on by the likes of Tom Cusack, Tom Staniforth, Sam Carter, Faalelei Sione, Lausii Taliauli and Andy Muirhead. Last season, they lost Staniforth to Sydney and didn't see much of Cusack and Carter, the latter only playing the Grand-Final and generally the success of 2017 meaning Muirhead and Taliauli in particular were involved more with the Brumbies. This year, there's been no Cusack again and Royals have seen little or none of their Brumbies talent. Instead, the Blue Bagger machine has been running of some new fuel, youth.

Indeed, the machine has been built over many seasons. Royals have a culture, and identity and you can see that in everything they do, personified by their Captain Ben Johnston and star halfback Pedro Rolando. You add in the foot soldiers, the Bodmans, Swains, Goings of the world, those types and you start to see success forming. What the competition didn't see was the wave of young talent coming through.









Rory Scott has been a revelation this season. His days in the John I Dent Cup may already be numbered with higher honours not too far over the horizon. The return of Siuta Tai to Royals, another key addition. Sam Von Blanckensee and Jack Farrell, great additions and Lincoln Smith a year older and more experienced. That core helped Royals to a second-place finish but even at that, Royals only lost two games, both against Vikings. With the returning Brumbies embedded in the newly updated Blue Bagger Machine, Royals were astonishing against the Champions two weeks ago.

Not because they were amazing in attack (they were at times), not because they lost BJ, their talisman at half-time (fingers crossed we see him lead out the side today) but because they never gave up, and defended like dogs for 80 minutes, taking their chances when they needed to. Dynasty is a word often associated with sport. Royals can't claim that yet, though they will if they keep adding trophies to their cabinet but every year, they are there or thereabouts. One step closer this year, than last year, and Wayne Southwell's side will begin to be talked as one of the best sides in John I Dent Cup.

Towards the backend of the year, Swain, Lonergan and co. came back into the fold, adding steam to the Vikings charge to the Minor Premiership.

Whilst all attention in Canberra will be fixated on Viking Park on Saturday as the Grand Finals commence and we crown the victors of six different competitions, there's still the not insignificant matter of the Preliminary Final to be fought out in the regional South Coast Monaro competition and, with tournament favourites Taralga Tigers upset in the Qualification stage, there's an intriguing plot developing.

For the Tigers to lose one game in recent seasons has been a shock, but to see them downed in back-to-back clashes on successive weekends has sent shockwaves throughout the rest of the division. Royals will take on the rampaging Queanbeyan Whites in the Colts Grand Final as two teams that have lit-up the competition go head-to-head in the showdown at Viking Park in Erindale. The scorebook might currently read 2-1 to Royals, based on results in the 2019 competition to date, but the in-form Whites will no doubt provide a serious threat to the Royals in the final.

In the Colts' division there have been clear leaders on the ladder throughout the competition, Royals being red hot in the opening rounds, Queanbeyan hitting their straps at the back end, and Gungahlin Eagles being the dominant force throughout. A win for the Whites would see them claim a second Colts title in the past three seasons, emphasising the quality of the young players coming through the Queanbeyan production line. Royals though have some young guns of their own and, if they can fire, they could cap a tremendous conclusion to a cracking Colts campaign.

It might just be the most improbable Grand Final storyline of all time. Wests, who ended the First Division Second Grade ladder in sixth, having lost more games (six) than they had won (five) are eighty minutes away from writing a remarkable conclusion to a memorable final's series. Whites will have slight favouritism, but Wests fairy-tale story may have one more chapter yet.

The Bob Hitchcock Territory Shield didn't go on the line until Round 5 in 2019 when the Canberra Royals, who successful held the initial Shield over the summer break, put it up for challenge at their inaugural home match of the season, the visit of the Uni-Norths Owls on Saturday 4 May. Royals didn't have it all their own way as they held-off a strong-finishing Owls to win 33-25, Pedro Rolando crossing for two tries and kicking four conversions in the victory.

Wayne Southwell's team were to defend the Shield successfully twice more, a spirited 47-24 win over Queanbeyan Whites in Round 7, Ben Johnston gaining two of the Royals eight tries, and a 75-15 blow-out of Easts a round later, the eleven-try hammering including a double for hooker Siuta Tai.

After seven successful defences of the trophy, Royals eventually succumbed in Round 10 at their home ground, against the Tuggeranong Vikings, with Nick Scrivener and his men not only wresting the Shield away from Royals but doing so with a superb performance hitting the fifty-point mark in a huge 54-17 win. Dean Wilson claimed two of the Vikings eight tries with Ryan Lonergan ending the match with 19 points.

Putting the Shield up for grabs again a week later, the Vikings enjoyed a more prosaic 29-20 victory over the Owls, the difference between the teams the kicking of Isaac Thompson as both sides scored four tries with the owls failing to land any of their shots at goal. The challenge went into hiatus until Round 16 when Vikings brushed aside Wests 63-14, Albert Watego crossing for four tries, setting up a final round decider with Royals.

Fittingly it was a nail-biting contest with Vikings edging home 22-17 to secure the Shield for 2019. Vikings will put it up for defence in their first home match of the 2020 season.
