Peter started at the New Norfolk bridge over the Derwent at 1 am and finished after passing the Tasman Bridge just after 1pm, a total of 12 hours 18 minutes to cover the journey. Interestingly, the maximum water temperature was 22.9C whilst the maximum air temperature was 26.6C.

SOAKS Old Boys are tremendously proud of Peter's powers of endurance and determination.

'Chalky' churns his way down the Derwent, passing the MONA ferry on the way before sighting the Tasman Bridge and accepting his well-earned recognition.









Vale Rob Kerstan:

SOAKS stalwart and friend to all, Robin 'Herby' Kerstan passed away in early February this year after stoically battling cancer for some time.

Rob played with SOAKS 1976-1983 and apart from a few seasons of Aussie Rules he was a one club SOAKS Bloke. He played in most positions in the forward pack and enjoyed Premiership success towards the end of his career with SOAKS successful Reserves in the early 1980's.

He was an absolute gentleman, self-effacing and generous in spirit. He really enjoyed re-connecting with former team mates through the SOAKS Old Boys functions and that included his former New Town High School Rugby team mates as well. R.I.P. Herby



Farewell Robin 'Herby' Kerstan (by Tim Oxley)

We were saddened to note the passing away of Robin 'Herby' Kerstan recently.

Robin grew up on a farm near Nubeena on the Tasman Peninsula, the son of Erika and Herbie Kerstan. He boarded at New Town High School where Rugby was a well-established sport. Starting in the Under 14s, progressing to U16 and then U18 at EMC after which he joined Associates with several old team mates from school.

Herby played in the forwards - front row, second row or loose forward - wherever he was needed. He always gave a big effort and was a capable and reliable player. Strong and silent, Herby contrasted well with some of the other players.

Herby worked in administration at the Hydro. His wife Faye says that he loved Rugby, often talking with affection about the games, the social events and friendships maintained through the old Associates.

Herby and Faye fostered a baby girl, Skylah, who is now 15 years old. She loved her "Poppy" and misses him dearly. He is also survived by his daughter, Narelle, and her 13-year-old son, who is passionate about go-kart racing, which Robin enjoyed watching.

In retirement, he kept busy gardening, being the volunteer Master Chef, and being a positive influence for grandson Harrison and Skylah.

Herby was remembered and his friendship and contribution commemorated at the last Associates drinks in February 2022. RIP Robin 'Herby' Kerstan

One of Rob's fondest funny memories of his time with SOAKS is recalled below (taken from Rob's SOAKS Profile):

There were many fun and hilarious times (enjoyed with SOAKS). One story comes to mind: the Goulburn Hotel was a base during the late 70's and on game day evenings after amber lubrication players regularly burst into song. On one occasion a disreputable patron scorned the SOAKS singing, in an instant a lone voice rang out singing "dickhead" to the tune of auld lang syne. Within seconds the team, visiting players and sympathetic patrons joined in, the hotel owner smiled ear to ear providing the necessary decorum. The sound of "dickhead" was deafening, the bar room was resonating, inevitably the hapless patron broke and stormed out muttering 'F...something'. The crowd was full of mirth and a few rounds of Rusty Nails were consumed. Some 40 years later the vernacular "dickhead" still triggers memories of this classic SOAKS 1970's jingle.

Name and Nick name? Simon Himson (No nick name that I can recall, but others may have names for me.)

When did you play for SOAKS? 1978-1980, 1984 (Editor's note: Simon also played in a couple a of senior grade matches in 1984.)

Why did you decide to play for SOAKS?

In 1977 whilst playing at EMC we had two SOAKS blokes coaching for us. Peter 'Chalky' Tucker and Bruce Inglis (What happened to Bruce?) and despite enticement to us all to play for Taroona we remained true to SOAKS.

Did you play rugby with other clubs? Eastern Suburbs Rugby Club in Sydney in 1981 and Tas Uni in the 1980 Intervarsity

What position/s did you play? Half-back

What are your 3 fondest memories of your time with SOAKS?

In my first Senior Game at Eadie Street scoring a try against Glenorchy. Also playing Colts in 1978 for SOAKS and winning the premiership in that year. Fast Fun and furious.

The Cox family especially Orrie Cox with the 'Magic Water' and half-time oranges.

Who was your most respected local rival? The late Greg Sawyer (University RFC)

In your time with SOAKS who had the most influence on you and why?

Albeit not at SOAKS my biggest Rugby influence was Oliver Wilson, coach at New Town High School, University RFC and State player and head of English at NTHS. A furious rugby player and thorough gentleman. Also, David Smith, Tas Schoolboy Coach and Taroona RFC player. Upon reflection, it shows the influence of good coaches and the importance of good roles models in one's youth.

What other non-playing role/s did you take on with SOAKS?

None I am ashamed to say. I left at age 20 to work in Sydney. (Editor's note: Simon was the Club Captain in 1980 and was quite possibly the youngest to ever do so.)

What was the funniest thing you remember from your time with SOAKS?

With a fight breaking out in the bar at the Goulburn Hotel, Tim (Mungo) Muggleston made the brave decision to go upstairs (slowly) to retrieve his mouth guard before intervening, by which time the usual chaos had been restored.

Any other comments? Not at moment wasted (well not many).

Bob Hardstaff...the legend!

For those of you who read the SOAKS Old Boys newsletter assiduously, you will recall Tim Oxley offered the following in 2019:

Fans of the game will welcome the return of Hardstaff who made his debut last century playing reserve grade for Associates Rugby Club in Hobart. According to Tasmanian Rugby Union records, Hardstaff has played in everyposition in a rugby team, and on several occasions achieved this in a single game.

Bob was often the difference, particularly in the more technical aspects of the game. He could play anywhere. You could say he's played everywhere. It's like there was more than one of him.

Hardstaff's ability to keep grinding out season after season is legendary. I just don't know how he keeps it up for so long when most of us gave it away long ago.

One would believe that Hardstaff was simply a mythical figure, but research has revealed that in 1980 the esteemed Rugby chronicle, Hobart's *Mercury* announced to the Rugby world the debut of Bob Hardstaff. In an unassuming final paragraph, the performance of Hardstaff is documented.

At Eady St the Stags pack won easy ball despite strong games by Retallick and Pullen for Easts.

Glenorchy's inside backs completed the formula for success by putting constant pressure on their Rooster counterparts. Gordon Campbell was

Gordon Campbell was back to his brilliant best in the centre. John Campbell, John Manley and Tony Hale also played well for Glenorchy, who are playing great rugby at the right stage of the season.

Dave Smith and Jim Scott relished the easier going to help Taroona to a 66-0 crushing of Harlequins.


