The picture at the top of the Griffin Legal John I Dent Cup is becoming much clearer, with the top-three recording key victories in round seven. Preseason form guide probably would have put Eagles, Royals, Vikings and Owls in the playoff positions, but the order through seven games may have surprised a few.

Starting with the Eagles, who have been simply brilliant to start 2019. Five bonus point wins in five games means Gungahlin top the ladder heading into today's full slate of games. Their latest victory, 38-32 over Owls was the latest litmus test of Marco Caputo's contenders. Owls are pushing forward this year, and despite going behind early against the Eagles they pushed the table toppers all the way and have made similar valiant efforts in defeat against Royals and Tuggeranong. So that just rubber stamps that this Eagles side are here to stay and are no longer a dark horse.

They'll be heavily favoured against Wests today at Jamison Enclosed in the Hahn Superdry Match of the Round, but the Lions won't be tamed easily at home and have shown an ability to shock and awe this season, though it hasn't led to enough winning. Not too far away the Owls will look to

consolidate their position in fourth against the Whites at ANU North Oval.

Quietly unbeaten, Royals are not far behind Gungahlin. Last Saturday saw the Blue Baggers beat Queanbeyan 56-24 at Phillip Oval, a brace a piece from Siuta Tai and Ben Johnston being the difference on the day. Royals don't seem to be getting the same kind of buzz as the Eagles so far this season, and it's hard to know why. Perhaps it's because they haven't had to play either Vikings or Gungahlin yet but Royals are building nicely, and they'll be right up for it against Easts today. There is absolutely no love lost between Easts and Royals, and the Suburbs would love nothing more than to knock of the Blue Baggers today to get their first notch in the win column.

Easts had a tough go of it in round seven, on the end of a 80-17 hammering by the Champions, Vikings. This was a real statement from Vikings, their form is not quite where we may have expected it to be. A plethora of names were on the scoresheet for Tuggies, who certainly seemed to have withheld their best performance for Easts.




## RUGBY IN THE ACT — THE EARLY YEARS

Accounts of the new game of rugby football spread from Sydney throughout the Monaro District in the 1870s and in 1878, Queanbeyan and Yass played Rugby. Uniforms at the time were guernseys, knickerbockers o below the knee, and long socks and boots. One of the earliest teams, Bibbenluke on the Monaro, played in green guernseys with a red cross on the chest.

The Quenabeyan Age reported on 27 June 1888, that a match between Queanbeyan and Goulburn became so heated that a Goulburn player suffered a broken collarbone and a Queanbeyan player, Isaiah Lazarus, was badly hurt making a tackle. "Tempers flared," said the newspaper, "and in one scrimmage a Queanbeyan player

collared a Goulburn man about the region of the scalp; the man so collared resented this treatment by giving his opponent a gentle shaking, upon which the Queanbeyan player referred to, in a clear and melodious tone, informed the visitors that if they required anything his address was the backyard of the Royal Hotel."

Queanbeyan was the lively centre of the game during the early years of the twentieth century, with teams called the Waratahs, Golden Eagles, Wallaroos and Warrigals in action. Further South, elementary competitions had started in the area from Cooma to Bombala and Delegate. Some towns took their rugby seriously enough to award caps to players selected in their teams.



After World War I, Rugby matches continued to play a prominent role in the life of towns on the Southern tablelands, but by the mid-1920's most teams had switched to League. The exception was the Royal Military College, Duntroon whose cadets had played Rugby as their main winter sport since its establishment in 1911. Rugby vanished from the ACT when the RMC transferred to Sydney in 1931, and apart from at the Canberra Grammar School, was not played there again until the Military College returned to Duntroon in 1937.

One of the officers at Duntroon, Colonel Horace Robertson, known as "Red Robbie", was a keen rugby fan, and enlisted support from ACT businessmen and Canberra's population of just over 8000. Among those who helped get the code re-established was Major Phillip Cardale, coach of the RMC team; John Kelly, the driving force behind Easts; John Dent, who donated the Dent Cup for first grade competition; A.K. Healy, a stalwart of the Northern Suburbs Club; and Don Rodgers, then a reporter for the labour Daily.

Helped by businessman Bill Woodger, public servants Tom Carmody, A.L. Ramsey, Fred Doran, Jack Merriless, Roy Alexander, Keith Waugh and plumber Jack Kelly, Rodgers forged the ACT Rugby Union into a viable force. Starting with a series of friendly matches in 1937, the ACTRU launched a competition for four clubs in 1938. They were the Royal Military College, Northern Suburbs, Eastern Suburbs and Canberra University College, at that time an offshoot of Melbourne University. The competition, always for the John Dent Cup, has continued ever since, apart from a break during the 1942-45 World War II years.

Of the four foundation clubs, Royal Military



College and Northern Suburbs continued without a break and have been frequent grand finalists. Eastern Suburbs dropped out between 1950 and 1953 but remerged to help the code's continued growth. The Canberra University College did not re-form in 1946, and was replaced by the Australian National University Club, when the University was established.

# ROYALS 70th ANNUARSARY CELEBRATING FIVE-IN-A-ROW

There's never been an era of dominance like that exercised by Canberra Royals between 1984 and 1994 when the Blue Baggers reached an incredible ELEVEN successive John I Dent Cup Finals. That included their record-setting five-in-arow from 1987 through to 1991. Equally incredibly, they played and defeated Daramalan, now Gungahlin Eagles in four of those five matches, Tuggeranong Vikings being the other victims in the last of the streak.

It was so nearly seven-in-a-row as Royals won the 1985 Final against Darmalan 13-4 before Daramalan exacted revenge a year later, winning 13-9. This was the era of the Royals and Darmalan axis of the competition, the duo perennial Grand Finalists and sick to the back teeth of seeing each other on the big day. More so for the fore-runners of the Eagles as they, more often than not, were the one's that went home with their tail between their legs.

Over the course of the next half-a-dozen pages we reprint the team line-ups, as they were presented in the official match programs of the time. It makes for interesting reading to see the changes in personnel across both clubs during this amazing period of the club game in Canberra. Kicking off this special section of Stampede, are the teams from the 1953 showdown between Royals and RMC. This was Royals third Grand Final of their record 39 appearances, a game they lost 5-18 before winning their maiden title twelve months later.

In an ordinary game of rugby union, there's thirty people on the field who all, at some stage or another, probably be the centre of attention; the playmakers, the try-scorers, the heroes for their respective sides. Everyone wants to stand out and make an impression, looking to highlight their talents in front of all the onlookers who have come to watch eighty minutes of rugby.

However, the 31st man on the field is arguably the most important and can be the biggest influence on the match, although their role is to try and stay out of the spotlight for as long as possible. Match officials play a crucial part in ensuring games can go ahead and be run fairly for both teams participating, making the game an equal experience for everyone involved.

Reuben Keane knows what it's like to be on both sides of the coin, as a player for

the Canberra Royals Premier Grade side, as well as being one of the most sought-after referees in the Canberran Rugby ranks. Coming up as a junior to now play at the top level in the ACT as well as perform referee duties on the side, Keane says the influence to his current pathway started early.

"For me it more started as a player," he said. "I was a junior player in Under 9's and then from there, my dad got involved as a referee and probably half way through school, I was refereeing and playing every weekend. That's pretty much continued still to this day. My Dad's influence got me into it a bit but at the time, it was a bit of cash for a year 8 kid that didn't have much money!

"I'm still playing for Royals at the moment in premier grade, very much enjoying that. Pretty much from year 8 onwards it's been week in, week out but at the moment it's a bit difficult with only bye-weeks that I referee, there's still a lot of playing." Reuben isn't the only player in his family with brother Bryce selected to play in the ACT schoolboys team last year in last year's championships. The referee/player dynamic under the same roof may be awkward for some but Keane says it's helped the pair develop in their separate roles and understand how to run the game.

"It makes for interesting some conversations!" Keane said. know he's now a notorious player for having good questions for referees and that can definitely come from some of the conversations we've had over the dinner table on a Saturday night. We've both benefitted from it a lot, it's an interesting dynamic but its tended to work in both of our favours. A lot of referees talk about going from being the first priority to the 31st man. You have to take a back seat to facilitate the game. You're trying not to be noticed but sometimes you might have to be noticed. Every game is different; some games you have to take a stand but in

some others, you can just take that 31st man position and let the game happen without intervening too much."

Off the back of the schoolboy's tournament and officiating at the rugby sevens tournament in the Commonwealth Games, Keane says the experience was a straightforward one which has now set him up for bigger chances in the future.

"I just took it as it came, you just have to match what the standard is and stay to that," he said." You do what you normally do, that's why you're picked for those sorts of things. There's a lot of opportunity in refereeing at the moment, especially with Rugby Sevens which is one of the fastest growing forms of the game and there will be some chances down that path. The World Series is becoming more of an opportunity for me, I think that will still take its time but the regular circuit is still in my sights though the timeline leaves a bit of a question mark for me."
